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Business Physical Disaster Loans	U.S. Small Business Association	These loans provide private non-profit organizations or businesses with loans up to \$2 million to repair or replace real property, machinery, equipment, fixtures, inventory, and leasehold improvements. In addition, the loans may be increased by as much as 20 percent for improvements designed to protect the damaged property against possible future disasters of the same type. 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Community Development Block Grant	HUD	In response to disasters, Congress may appropriate additional funding for the CDBG programs as Disaster Recovery grants to rebuild the affected areas and provide crucial seed money to start the recovery process. Since CDBG Disaster Recovery assistance may fund a broad range of recovery activities, HUD can help communities and neighborhoods that otherwise might not recover due to limited resources.	Available to States, units of general local governments, Indian tribes, and Insular areas designated by the President as disaster areas. These communities must have significant unmet recovery needs and the capacity to carry out a disaster recovery program.
